Good Money Habit Tips for Younger Children



- Open a saving account for your child when he or she is born. This may also encourage friends or family to contribute.
- Use a clear jar to save at home, so they can see their progress. Deposit into their account at Wings as needed.
- Encourage regular saving practices. You could also teach your child to use the Spend-Share-Save, 3 jar method.
- Play money games with your child. We have included a list of boardgames with money themes.
- Help your child begin to understand the value of money by having them buy something small on their own, like a snack. Let them receive and keep the change, and then encourage them to put it in a piggy bank.
- Have money conversations. Keep them basic and age appropriate.
- Turn a grocery-shopping trip into a bargain-hunting game. Example: Can your child find a \$3 box of cereal? (See our Grocery Store Scavenger Hunt Activity)
- Engage together in payment transactions. Get them involved, especially with cash transactions.
- Have your kids comparison shop to find the most expensive and least expensive juice. Talk about why one costs more and may or may not be a good value.
- Make them use their own money.
- If it works for your family, pay your child an allowance for designated chores. Kids will learn very quickly that they can tie effort and input into financial rewards.
- Teach them about delayed gratification. We can't always get what we want, when we want it. When we really want something, sometimes we have save for it.
- Let them know how your family saves money.
- Community service as a family is one of the best ways to share your values with your children
- Help your children learn to budget, as they get older. This could include balancing wants vs. needs, comparing prices or watching for sales.
- They will make money mistakes, we all do. Let them make mistakes and use it as a teachable lesson (spending money on a toy they never use).
